Foreword

Pembrokeshire County Council is responsible for promoting high educational standards and for delivering efficient primary and secondary education. - The condition, suitability and standard of school buildings
- Value for money

1. Introduction

Pembrokeshire County Council has a statutory duty to secure sufficient and suitable school places in its area and to determine whether it is making the best use of the resources and facilities to deliver the opportunities that children deserve.

At its meeting on 8th May 2025, Pembrokeshire County Council considered a report of the School Modernisation Working Group which outlined the findings of a review of education provision in the Preseli area. In particular the review considered the extent of surplus school places in the area, set against a significant decline in the pupil population. The report outlined the current position in relation to Ysgol Clydau, including the cost of primary school places, and concluded with a recommendation. It also recognised Ysgol Clydau being defined as a 'Rural' school in the context of the '*Presumption against the closure of rural schools*' within Welsh Government's School Organisation Code with Council resolving to consider / scrutinise the content of the Proposal Paper as part of its decision making process.

The decision of Council was as follows:

That the Director of Education be authorised to commence statutory consultation on the proposal to discontinue Ysgol Clydau

This document fulfils part of the County Council's responsibility under the School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013 to consult with appropriate stakeholders and to explain the Council's proposal to discontinue Ysgol Clydau. This document offers an opportunity for consultees to put forward any comments, observations or alternative proposals they wish to be considered, as well as explaining why other options considered are not the preferred option.

Consultation on this proposal will comply with the requirements of the School Organisation Code. Consequently, the main purpose of this document is to provide information and to gather the views of identified stakeholders. For further information on the statutory process, see Section 7.

2.2 Consultation with children and young people

The children and young people attending all the schools identified above will be able to participate in the consultation process through their School Councils. The information provided to children and young people will be presented in a way that is relevant to their age and level of likely understanding and be in accordance with the National Standards for Children and Young People's Participation. The information gathered from the consultation with pupils will form part of the Consultation Report which will subsequently be considered by Council.

2.3 When does the consultation period start and end?

You can submit your views in favour of, or against the proposal. Responses received during the consultation period will not be treated as statutory objections. If you wish to object, you will need to do so in writing during the statutory objection period outlined in Section 7.

2.4 What will happen after the consultation process?

At the end of the consultation period the feedback will be collated and included in a Consultation Report which will be subsequently presented to the County Council. This report will be available to be viewed on the Council website and hard copies obtainable on request at EducationConsultations@pembrokeshire.gov.uk or by calling 01437 775164. Council will consider the report and decide whether it wishes to proceed with the proposal or not.

If Council decides not to proceed, that will be the end of this proposal. However, if Council decides to proceed, a Statutory Notice will be published. The Statutory Notice will be published on the Council's website and posted in the named schools and other conspicuous places within the community. Copies of the notice will be made available to the relevant schools to distribute to pupils, parents/carers and members of staff.

In accordance with The School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013, anyone wishing to make objections to the proposal will have the opportunity to do so. To be considered as statutory objections, objections will need to be made in writing or by email, and sent to the Council within 28 days of the date on which the statutory notice was published.

If objections are received, these will be summarised into an Objection Report, which will be published on the Council's website with parents/carers/guardians and staff members of the relevant schools advised of its availability. All consultees listed earlier in this section will receive hard copies of the report or be emailed a link to the relevant location on the website.

The Objection Report will subsequently be considered by Council before determining whether the proposal should proceed or not. When a decision is made, it will be published on the Council's website and all consultees informed.

3. The Status Quo – Background

3.1 Ysgol Clydau

Ysgol Clydau is a 4-11 community primary school located in the village of Tegryn and is maintained by Pembrokeshire County Council. The school draws its pupils from a large rural area to the east of Crymych, and from areas within the neighbouring Carmarthenshire County Council area. The school's catchment area generally serves the Boncath and Clydau electoral ward, but it also encroaches slightly into the Crymych and Mynachlogddu, and Cilgerran and Eglwyswrw electoral wards. The school's catchment area is shown later in this section.

The age profile of pupils on roll in September 2025, for each class, and the figures recorded for the previous four annual school censuses for the school are as follows:



3.3 School Capacity

Capacity is measured using the "Measuring the Capacity of Schools in Wales" formula; this excludes nursery accommodation and nursery pupils. School capacities are reviewed annually and may change when a school changes the way it uses its accommodation and when building alterations take place. In order to establish a comparison between capacity and usage, nursery pupils are shown separately and excluded from such forecasts.

3.4 Pupil Forecasts

An exercise to forecast future pupil numbers is undertaken annually following the verification of the January pupil census by Welsh Government. Forecast pupil numbers are calculated using the following assumptions:

- All year 6 pupils move to secondary provision;
- All year groups move forward chronologically;
- Reception pupils based on one of the following:
 - o The school's Admission Number
 - Reception pupils offered places on the common 'offer date'
 - o The school's own assessment based on local intelligence
 - An average of Reception admission over previous 5 years.

As at the closing date (30 April 2025) for 2026 nursery admissions, there were no applications.

3.5 Pupil Yield from Housing

Information in relation to the potential pupil yield from new housing in the area is based on both the Council's and the Pembrokeshire Coast National Park's annual monitoring report [AMR]. In the context of this proposal, housing commitments which are either under construction or identified as being deliverable within a five-year period amount to approximately 14 units. Based upon the assumption that each dwelling yields on average 0.15 pupils, these housing developments would yield approximately 2 pupils.

This does not represent a significant increase in housing and the potential yield resulting from it should be accommodated within current capacity.

3.6 Buildings / Accommodation

Records indicate that the school was built in 1880 with some modifications being undertaken during the first decade of the 21st century. Prior to September 2000, the school was called Tegryn CP School, but following an amalgamation with Bwlchygroes CP, the school became Ysgol Clydau.

As at the review of school capacity undertaken in the autumn of 2024, Ysgol Clydau had three class bases with a total area of 135.8m².

The school is graded as "C" (Poor) for condition and "B" (Satisfactory) for suitability.

Welsh Government defines condition grade 'C' as "Operational but major repair or replacement needed in the short to medium-term (generally 3 years). Typically, a grade C school features one or more of the following:

- Requiring replacement of building elements or services elements in the short to medium-term,
- several structural, building envelope, building services or statutory compliance issues apparent, or one particularly significant issue apparent,
- often including identified problems with building envelope (windows/roof etc.), building services (boilers/chillers etc.),
- likely to have major impacts upon the operation of the building, but still allow it to be operable"

Similarly, Welsh Government defines suitability grade 'B' as "Satisfactory, performing as intended, but does not effectively support the delivery of the curriculum in some areas".

The land and buildings occupied by the school are in the ownership of Pembrokeshire County Council.

4. Current School Standards

The most recent Estyn judgements and the report of the School Improvement Advisor for the school which is the subject of the proposal is as follows.

4.1 Estyn Inspection

The school was last inspected in September 2023; the overview of the inspection report and recommendations are shown below; consultees may access the full report via the Estyn website.

Overview

Ysgol Clydau is a happy, caring and welcoming community. There is a clear emphasis on respecting others and ensuring the best possible standards of well-being for the school's pupils and staff. Most pupils behave very well and treat each other and adults extremely respectfully and politely. The school has a strong culture of safeguarding and, as a result, pupils feel safe and enjoy their time at the school.

Many pupils make suitable progress during their time at the school, for example when developing their language, numeracy and digital skills. They apply these skills appropriately across a range of contexts. Most pupils make good progress in their creative and physical skills and show robust attitudes towards physical activities.

Teachers and assistants foster a very homely and supportive working relationship with pupils. They are good language models and support pupils to recall previous learning effectively. Staff provide a curriculum that makes purposeful use of the local area and engages the interest and ignites the curiosity of nearly all pupils. At times, teachers do not provide activities that challenge a few pupils to achieve to the best of their ability, particularly those who are more able. When pupils are given an opportunity to do so, they respond positively to feedback and improve their work purposefully. However, feedback for pupils does not focus specifically enough on important aspects for improvement. As a result, too often, pupils are not aware of the next steps in their learning.

The headteacher has a clear vision for the school that prioritises equal access to well-being, happiness and the best learning experiences for all pupils. This vision is shared purposefully with the school's pupils, staff, parents and governors. The headteacher is supported in a very dedicated way by a small team of staff. Leaders have an appropriate understanding of the school's strengths and areas for improvement. The governing body are proud of their school and passionate about their responsibilities. They provide the school's leaders and staff with purposeful support.

Recommendations

- R1 Ensure that teachers' feedback helps pupils to improve their work
- R2 Ensure appropriate challenge for all pupils

4.2 School Improvement Advisor report

Quality and Standards in Education

The school was last inspected by Estyn in September 2023. The following represents a summary of their findings and of the Improvement Advisors' report for 2024/25.

- Nearly all pupils have a positive attitude to learning. They concentrate well in lessons for extended periods and apply themselves to learning quickly on arrival in the classroom.
- The school maintains a very strong focus on wellbeing, which supports vulnerable pupils and encourages all pupils to contribute their ideas about their learning.
- A friendly, inclusive and welcoming ethos contributes firmly to supporting pupils to be proud of belonging to one big family. A strong emphasis on respecting others contributes effectively towards developing thoughtful pupils who are very well behaved and take pride in their school and their community
- Nearly all pupils appreciate that adults treat them fairly and listen to them
- Pupils make strong progress in their Welsh oracy skills, becoming confident speakers.
- Many pupils' reading skills develop effectively as they move through the school
- Many pupils develop their writing skills appropriately and apply them successfully across the curriculum
- Most pupils make suitable progress in their mathematical skills.
- Many pupils' digital skills are developing appropriately.
- Nearly all pupils develop well as independent learners
- Nearly all pupils develop a good understanding of the importance of being ethical and principled citizens
- Pupil attendance in January 2025 was 92.23%, this figure is above the average for Pembrokeshire schools for that period.

The school currently has the equivalent of 2.0 teachers for the 33 pupils on roll. The base leader has a teaching commitment of 0.8 (4 days/week). The school receives strategic leadership support of 0.2 (1 day/week) from Ysgol Bro Preseli.

Estyn and regular LA visits recognise that:

- Despite the challenges posed by the head teacher's decision to resign suddenly in May 2024, the governing body have created a strong contingency plan, sharing the expertise of leadership staff from Ysgol Bro Preseli and appointing a committed and capable base leader.
- The current base leader and the newly appointed class teacher have created a warm and nurturing environment at the school.
- Teachers and assistants foster a very homely and supportive working relationship with pupils.
- All of the staff know the pupils well and focus on ensuring the highest possible standards of well-being for them.
- The school demonstrates well established and highly effective pedagogical practice for early years pupils, these pupils develop high levels of independence and make substantial use of a well resourced outdoor area. This effective practice has been shared with other schools on a number of occasions.
- The school is developing a curriculum that is firmly rooted in the local area, with a strong sense of "cynefin", this reflects the needs of its pupils and community.

- Leaders are very dedicated and hard-working in delivering a curriculum that is interesting, engages pupils' interest and pays appropriate attention to the context of the local area.
- Teachers demonstrate good curriculum knowledge and provide interesting lessons
- All staff are good language models and support pupils to recall previous learning effectively.
- At times, teachers do not provide activities that challenge a few pupils to achieve to the best of their ability, particularly those who are more able
- There is a logical link between the aims outlined in the School Development Plan and professional learning activities;
- Leaders and governors have a suitable understanding of the school's strengths and areas for improvement.
- Leaders manage resources carefully, they ensure that there are suitable learning resources for each class.

Overall the school has been successful as a strong professional unit in showing resilience and commitment during a challenging period. They have succeeded in promoting an effective learning environment whilst ensuring continued pupil progress.

Need for Places and the impact on accessibility of schools

- There is suitable alternative school-based provision in neighbouring schools which have sufficient capacity and accommodation of at least equivalent quality for existing and projected pupil numbers at Ysgol Clydau.
- There is sufficient capacity in neighbouring schools of the same language category and religious character to Ysgol Clydau in order to accommodate displaced pupils.
- Less than half (17, 47.2%) of the children from the catchment attend their local school, with most of the remainder attending other neighbouring schools. In 2024, most of the pupils attending Ysgol Clydau attend from out of catchment.
- Six pupils currently receive free Home to School Transport to Ysgol Clydau. Whilst
 nearly all pupils would be eligible for school transport to alternative neighbouring
 schools, no journeys would be in excess of 45 minutes.

Resourcing of education and other financial implications

- The school has suffered a significant decline in pupil numbers over recent years and this is not forecast to be reversed significantly. It has been in a position of having significant surplus places since 2022, and implementing this proposal will result in reducing the surplus places in the area.
- In 2024/25 the school received funding which equated to £5,415 per pupil. The average funding per pupil across all Pembrokeshire schools was £4,110. It is anticipated that any net savings will contribute towards the Education budget savings required for future financial years in order to ensure a balanced budget for the Council.

5. The Proposal

5.1 The Proposal

The Council's proposal is as follows:

That the Director of Education be authorised to commence statutory consultation on the proposal to discontinue Ysgol Clydau.

Subject to approval, this proposal will result in the pupils on roll at Ysgol Clydau being transferred to Ysgol Bro Preseli in Crymych, or subject to expressions of parental preference, to any other school. It is proposed that Ysgol Clydau's catchment will be subsumed as part of an extended Ysgol Bro Preseli catchment, and this will impact upon both the school admissions and school transport entitlement criteria in the area.

Ysgol Bro Preseli is a 3-19 Category 3 (Welsh medium) school located in Crymych, some 4.2 miles from Ysgol Clydau. As an 'all-through' school, Ysgol Bro Preseli can ensure a consistency of approach to pedagogy and teaching and an uninterrupted progression of learning experiences for pupils from 3 to 19 years of age. This enables the school to plan for the development of skills and raising standards and enables one system to be used for tracking pupils' progress and the development of a wide range of skills through cross-phase links, i.e. in line with the National Mission which is shaping the future of the Welsh education system.

Subject to approval and parental preference, it is proposed that Ysgol Clydau will close on 31st August 2026, with pupils transferring to Ysgol Bro Preseli at the beginning of the 2026/27 academic year.

Within the context of the presumption against the closure of rural schools, Ysgol Clydau is currently designated as a 'rural school'.

5.1.2 Advantages and Disadvantages of the Proposal

 Ysgol Bro Preseli is a 3-19 school and this has an advantage in that it removes the transition from the primary to the secondary phase. All pupils are known to all teaching and support staff from the time they commence at the school and is an aid to wellbeing. Furthermore, an 'all-through' school provides a consistent approach to pedagogy and teaching and an uninterrupted experience of learning experiences. 5.1.3 Impact of the proposal

Discontinue Ysgol Clydau with pupils, subject to parental preference, transferring to Ysgol Bro Preseli

Standards and progress overall, of specific groups and in skills; wellbeing and attitudes to learning.

The proposal would ensure that the standards and progress of pupils would continue to improve, due to greater opportunities to develop the progression of groups of learners and skills in a 3-19 school setting.

Well-being and attitudes to learning can be enhanced in a 3-19 school, by eliminating the transition points.

Quality of teaching, the breadth, balance and appropriateness of the curriculum, and the provision of skills.

The proposal would provide teaching and support staff with more opportunity to develop professionally, enabling greater opportunities for staff to move between key stages and further develop expertise.

It would enable a continued appropriate curriculum and wider extracurricular opportunities, which would improve attendance and educational outcomes.

Tracking, monitoring and the provision of learning support, personal development and safeguarding.

It would provide the opportunity for the head teacher to distribute key leadership tasks, such as child protection, literacy, numeracy, special educational needs et cetera, to a greater number of staff and across phases of education.

Quality and effectiveness of leaders and managers, self-evaluation processes and improvement planning, professional learning, and use of resources.

It would create leadership opportunities for other staff, and for others to specialise in key areas, which will enhance education provision and outcomes.

It would allow teaching and support staff access to a wider range of responsibilities including: improved career prospects; improved curriculum coordination; the opportunity to teach across a wider age range and across different phases; an increased range of expertise, and improved opportunities for staff interaction and cooperation.

Likely impact of the proposals on the ability of the school to deliver the full curriculum.

Ysgol Bro Preseli will continue to be able to deliver the full curriculum to all learners.

It would provide the conditions that would enable a broader and more diverse curriculum e,g. with the introduction of modern foreign languages, to meet the needs of pupils and in ways that would be viable and sustainable over the longer term;

It would improve the range and quality of facilities and learning resources available to the benefit of all pupils, and would enable greater continuity of support for vulnerable groups of pupils.

Furthermore, it would allow for the potential for financial savings in terms of staffing structures and purchase of services, which accrue to a larger school.

The extent to which the proposal would support the targets in the approved Welsh in Education Strategic Plan (WESP) and how the proposal would expand or reduce Welsh language provision.

The provision at Ysgol Bro Preseli will continue to support the objectives set out in the WESP. In particular, outcome 3 - More children continue to improve their Welsh language skills when transferring from one stage of their statutory education to another - outcome 4 - More learners study for assessed qualifications in Welsh (as a subject) and subjects through the medium of Welsh, and outcome 5 - More opportunities for learners to use Welsh in different contexts in school, are all areas that are anticipated to be supported through this proposal.

- 2. Secondary catchment as per the current Ysgol Bro Preseli catchment area provided on p. 26;

	3. Sixth Form admissions – all of Pembrokeshire.

5.3 Pupil Projections

5.4 School Catchment


A school's catchment area is the geographical area which it is designated by the County Council that the school should serve. Catchment areas are used by the Council:


- as a planning tool for forecasting demand for and plan provision to meet demand for school places;
- to prioritise the admission of pupils to oversubscribed schools;
- as an element of the home to school transport policy to organise school transport and to control costs;
- to enable schools to identify with the communities they serve;
- to give parents an indication of their local school.

Ysgol Clydau's catchment area is set out on Page 10 of this document; however, if a decision is made to discontinue the school, it is important that the relevant area is defined as part of another school or schools' catchment area. Given its adjacency to Ysgol Bro Preseli,

it is proposed that the Clydau catchment becomes wholly included as part of the catchment area of Ysgol Bro Preseli.

The map showing the extent of the proposed primary catchment is provided below, together with a map showing the current secondary catchment for Ysgol Bro Preseli, which would remain unchanged:





5.5 Impact Assessments

The following represent the Council's assessment of the impact of the proposal on the community, equalities, the Welsh language, transport and staff.

5.5.1 Community Impact Assessment

An assessment of community impact is attached at **APPENDIX 3**. However, any additional impacts arising as a result of consultation will be reflected in an amended version which will be published as part of the Consultation Report.

5.5.2 Equalities Impact

The proposal is unlikely to result in any negative impact on the protected characteristics identified in the Equality Act 2010. The full assessment is attached as **APPENDIX 4.**

5.5.3 Welsh language Impact

A Welsh Language Impact assessment is attached at **APPENDIX 5**. The proposal will have no impact on the Welsh language, given that the proposal is to transfer all children from Ysgol Clydau to Ysgol Bro Preseli, both of which are Category 3 (Welsh medium) schools.

5.5.4 Transport Impact

The Learner Travel (Wales) Measure 2008 places a duty on the Council to assess the travel needs of learners under the age of 19. In addition to those children who qualify for free transport provision due to meeting the eligibility for distance between home and school, the Council is under a legal obligation to assess the travel needs of learners who walk to school. In relation to the proposal included within this document, walking routes to schools are assessed to ensure that learners can reach their destination in safety. There are no changes proposed to the Council's Home to School Transport policy, but as outlined elsewhere in this consultation document, it is anticipated that the Ysgol Bro Preseli primary catchment will be extended to include the whole of the current Ysgol Clydau catchment.

5.5.5 Staff Impact

It is inevitable that various teaching and non-teaching staff will be affected by the proposal.

As such, staff and recognised trade unions are statutory consultees, to this consultation. Their views will be considered along with other statutory consultees at this stage in the process. Later in the process, should a Council decision be taken to progress with this proposal, further consultation would take place with affected staff and recognised trade unions on the impact of this decision and next steps.

5.6 Finance

From the point the Council approves its annual budget, a funding formula is applied to the Local Schools Budget to determine the funding that is delegated to each school, i.e. the funding directly managed by governing bodies for revenue expenditure. The School Funding (Wales) Regulations 2010 require 70% of funding for individual schools' budgets to be distributed in accordance with pupil-led factors. Authorities have discretion to distribute the remaining 30% on the basis of a range of factors so that they can take account of individual school circumstances. The detail in relation to schools' formula funding is published annually as part of the Section 52 Budget Statement.

5.6.3 Capital Investment

No capital investment will arise directly as a result of this proposal. However, Ysgol Bro Preseli is included as part of the Council's Sustainable Communities for Learning Rolling Programme with investment planned to address the condition of several of the original secondary school buildings; furthermore, and to recognise the school's status as an 'all-through' school, a physical link will be created between the current primary phase and the remainder of the school.

5.6.4 Title of land and buildings

The title of land and buildings at Ysgol Clydau rests with Pembrokeshire County Council. Canolfan Clydau, a popular community centre, is co-located on the school site and is leased by the Council to 'Canolfan Clydau'.

8. Frequently Asked Questions

If this proposal goes ahead, when would it be implemented?

On the basis of our current planning trajectory, Ysgol Clydau would close on 31st August 2026. Subject to parental preference, pupils would commence at Ysgol Bro Preseli from the beginning of the 2026/27 academic year.

The current arrangements, whereby Ysgol Bro Preseli provides leadership oversight, seems to be working well. Why can't this continue?

The current arrangement has no formal basis and is reliant on the goodwill of Ysgol Bro Preseli in providing leadership oversight. Should the governing body of Ysgol Bro Preseli choose to withdraw from the current agreement, then it would leave Ysgol Clydau in a difficult position with no leadership in place.

What are surplus places?

Each school has a published capacity which represents its physical capacity to accommodate pupils, i.e. the size and use of accommodation including classrooms. Ysgol Clydau's capacity is 71, however with only 35 children on roll at the school as at the 2025 PLASC, this represents 50% occupancy, or 50% spare places². The School Organisation Code states that "some spare places are necessary to enable schools to cope with fluctuations in numbers of pupils, but excessive numbers of unused places that could be removed mean that resources are tied up unproductively...where there are more than 10% surplus places in an area overall, local authorities should review their provision and should consider whether to make proposals for their removal if this will improve the effectiveness and efficiency of provision. A significant level of surplus provision is defined as 25% or more of a school's capacity and at least 30 unfilled places".

Will there be sufficient room for pupils at other local schools?

Yes, this is due to high levels of surplus places across the school estate in the area (see appendix 1). In the context of the Clydau catchment, Ysgol Bro Preseli had 322 spare places (52 primary and 270 secondary) at the time of the 2025 Pupil Census.

Isn't this a fait accompli whereby a decision to close the school has already been made.

No, the only decision made to date is one to consult on the school's closure. This document is part of the consultation process whereby parents, governors, staff, the wider community and several other stakeholders are given the opportunity to have their say. All responses received during the consultation period will be published as part of a subsequent Consultation Report which elected members of the Council will consider before being asked to decide on whether they wish to proceed to the next step.

How can I object to the Council's proposal?

As outlined in Section 7 of this document, the school organisation process is lengthy and can take several months to complete. The current stage of the process is consultation, where anyone can express their views. All responses to this consultation will be made available to Council so that elected members can make an informed decision on whether to proceed. Any objections received during the consultation process will not be treated as such. However, if Council decide to proceed to the next stage, i.e. publishing a statutory notice, then anyone may make a formal objection during the subsequent 28 day Objection period. Again, all objections received will be made available to Council prior to elected members making a final decision on the proposal.

If Ysgol Clydau is closed, how will parents be fairly represented on the governing body of Ysgol Bro Preseli?

A number of categories of school governor are represented on all maintained school governing bodies, including parent and community governors; such governors serve for a four year period. When vacancies arise, nominations are sought from all eligible parents/carers of the school, and if there are more nominations than vacancies, a Parent Governor election takes place. In the case of Community Governors, they are nominated by the governing body of a school to serve the community's interest. In both cases, there is ample opportunity for Clydau parents, or members of the wider community to serve on the governing body of Ysgol Bro Preseli when governor vacancies arise.

You're consulting with all other schools in the area – doesn't this proposal only affect Ysgol Clydau?

The proposal is limited to Ysgol Clydau. However, we are required to consult with all schools which are likely to be affected by the proposal, e.g. other neighbouring schools. We are aware that several children living in the Ysgol Clydau catchment already attend other schools in the area.

What will happen to the building if the Council decides to close the school?

If the decision is taken to close the school, the building would become surplus to Council requirements and the Property Department would look to dispose of, or lease the building, dependent on market interest. It is recognised that Canolfan Clydau, a popular community centre, is co-located on the school site and is leased by the Council to 'Canolfan Clydau'. There is no intention for this arrangement to change.

WELSH LANGUAGE IMPACT ASSESSMENT – AUTUMN 2025

This assessment has been undertaken in accordance with the guidelines outlined in Annex C of the School Organisation Code, together with wider considerations in line with guidance on assessing the impact of policy decisions on the Welsh language in the context of the Welsh Language Standards Regulations 2015. Furthermore, it is written in the context of a wider legal and policy framework including:

- The Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015, which requires public bodies in Wales to work towards 7 well-being goals, including A Wales of Vibrant Culture and Thriving Welsh Language.
- Cymraeg 2050, the Welsh Government strategy for increasing the use of Welsh, working towards securing a million Welsh speakers by 2050, and encouraging more people to use and speak Welsh in their everyday lives. We recognise that Welsh medium education is a crucial factor in delivering against this vision.
- Welsh in Education Strategic Plan. Outlines our 10 year vision for increasing and improving the planning of the provision of Welsh medium education in Pembrokeshire.

Who will this proposal effect directly?

The proposal will have an impact on all pupils currently attending Ysgol Clydau, and their parents/carers/guardians.

As a result of the consideration outlined in this impact assessment (table below) and in the Community Impact Assessment (appendix 3), it is considered that this proposal will have a neutral impact on the Welsh language. This is primarily because pupils currently studying at Ysgol Clydau will be able to continue to receive education in a category 3 Welsh medium school, be it Ysgol Bro Preseli or one of the other category 3 schools in the cluster, dependent on parental preference. Other factors outlined below also point to at least a neutral impact, including information about standards in the Welsh language in the proposed alternative school, and activities/facilities which would be available at that school.

1.4 Need for places and the impact on accessibility of schools

Local authorities must ensure that there are sufficient schools providing primary and secondary education for their area. Schools are regarded as sufficient if they are sufficient in number, character and equipment to provide for all pupils the opportunity of appropriate education3. In order to fulfil these duties, local authorities must ensure that they plan thoroughly and engage fully with relevant partners, including the appropriate religious bodies4 for schools serving their area which have a designated religious character.

In the light of the above, relevant bodies should have regard to the following factors:
